

Credit Recovery/Graduation Plan for Bryce Belanger
Summer 2015-June 2016

Bryce is currently at 13.79 credits. He needs 24 to graduate. In the past week, he has completed a project for .4 credits, and is mostly done with another .6 credit project. In addition, he has credit earned as of today for completing the personal finance math game. My best estimation is that he will be sitting at 15.25 credits at the end of July.

This will leave Bryce with 8.75 credits to earn in the next 11 months of school, or about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a credit per month. As his attendance has been very good with us, and he has demonstrated this past month that he is capable of working really hard, I do not anticipate a problem with him graduating with his class at the end of June. He could easily be done a few months early.

Bryce will earn approximately .5 credits per month through completing academic service projects (this is required of all students), and the balance through his community education, math, and independent study courses. This is very realistic, and achievable.

In closing, I feel that Bryce should be allowed to play sports. He gains no advantage from his change of schools in district, as we do not offer a separate sports program. He is on track as far as our program and his work so far this year to graduate. I feel it would be of benefit to him as a person to allow him to play.
