
To whom it may concern,

I'm writing to you today to discuss the eligibility case of Andres Nunes. Andres is a good kid who lost his way in school when his family situation started to deteriorate. He has since righted his ship and is on course to graduate with his class in June. I would ask that you take his request for an eligibility waiver under consideration.

Andres' family situation changed dramatically in between his freshman and sophomore years. His parents went through a divorce and Andres went into a tailspin. He bounced back and forth between homes and lost that support and consistency that comes from a traditional home setting. He stopped coming to school on a regular basis and fell behind academically. Last year he decided that he was going to take control of his life. He voluntarily entered the youth authority program in in Central Oregon and has turned his life around. He currently has 16.5 credits toward graduation (only .5 short of the required amount) and is ready to do what is necessary to graduate with his friends in June.

In his hope of playing his senior year of football with his peers he attended all of our summer workouts. He became a valued team mate and a good leader. He is not the most talented player in our program. In fact would probably play very little. I believe that Andres deserves your careful consideration for and eligibility waiver so he can participate with his friends this year. Thank you for your consideration on this matter.
