To Whom It May Concern:



Because we required this of her last school year, I noticed her compassion for school and friendship had depleted. Ashley is very aware that sports are a privilege and that it takes dedication, commitment, and certain requirements to participate. I also believe that Volleyball is so much more to Ashley. To her it is an outlet, a way for her to deal with stress and other anxieties life throws at her. The volleyball team is also an extension of her family. Her team and coach are people that she respects, confides in and loves. Volleyball is also an incentive for her to keep on track with her school work. She understands that when she is participating in a sport, and doesn't keep her grades up, there are negative consequences that affect her. Therefore, it makes more sense to me to have her play.
