Three practices into basketball season, Kiley dislocated her knee cap and was unable to play basketball. Softball is a very important part of her life. Not being able to play softabll due to a misunderstanding would be devastating to her.

Having missed so much school due to strep throat and viral infections of her tonsils, she got behind in most of her classes. At one point, she had four classes she was failing. She tried very hard to get caught up and improve her grades. She was able to accomplish this in all classes except English as some assignments were not completed in a timely manner. Some assignments were not allowed to be turned in at all because they were late and would not be graded.

Due to insurance reasons we were not able to have her tonsils removed. That has now been resolved and she is scheduled to have them removed on the 24th of this month.

If you will consider allowing her to play softball, she will make sure she never finds herself in this position in the future.

In nine years she has never failed a class and she will do whatever it takes to insure that she never fails another one.
